A story of impact



Centre for Naturopathic Medicine. with all pillars being of equal importance.



Based at SCU, NCNM offers opportunities for naturopathic education that are unparalleled in Australia. With access to the world-class clinical, research, and education facilities of a comprehensive research-intensive university, and the international networks, interprofessional collaboration, and placement opportunities within a multidisciplinary health faculty, students studying naturopathic medicine at SCU are provided unique opportunities not available in other institutions.

NCNM is housed at Australia's only university with a dedicated medicinal plant garden and herbarium, one of only two TGA-accredited natural products analytical chemistry laboratories, clinical research facilities focused on natural products, and state-of-the-art laboratories and teaching facilities.

In conjunction with global natural products leaders - including the University of Mississippi and University College London -NCNM is launching the world's first executive education, undergraduate and postgraduate programs in natural product drug discovery and development.

Commitment to integration

NCNM is committed to integration and education of all health professions to improve health outcomes. NCNM achieves through developing innovative programs, including the following.

> NCNM has developed the world's first graduate entry naturopathic program launched in 2023, allowing medical practitioners, pharmacists, nurses and allied health practitioners to graduate and qualify as accredited naturopathic practitioners. NCNM is the first naturopathic education provider to have all naturopathic programs accredited by Australian Register of Naturopaths and Herbalists.

> NCNM has developed Australia's first accredited lifestyle medicine qualification launched in 2022 (the Master of Lifestyle Medicine). Developed in collaboration with the Australasian Society for Lifestyle Medicine, this multidisciplinary program allows practitioners direct entry to internationally recognised fellowships in Lifestyle Medicine, and is the only Australian qualification that meets eligibility requirements for the International Board of Lifestyle Medicine.

An internationally recognised integrative medicine leader



NCNM course content is being utilised to grow the naturopathic profession globally. NCNM has worked with naturopathic programs in Canada, New Zealand and Switzerland to develop degree recognition pathways for their naturopathic program offering up opportunities for naturopaths globally. NCNM is developing licensing agreements in Canada, Japan, New Zealand, Poland, Slovenia, South Korea and the United Kingdom to help grow the global naturopathic profession.



Through NCNM, SCU is one of only two Australian universities - and the only naturopathic program globally - to have been accepted into the Academic Consortium of Integrative Medicine and Health, joining prestigious members including Harvard Medical School, the University of Arizona and University of Washington. Through this partnership, NCNM has developed a partnership with the Cleveland Clinic - consistently ranked the World's number 1 hospital - with clinician-researchers able to complete NCNM PhD while completing their clinical training at the Cleveland Clinic.



NCNM has secured \$165,000 in funding from the Department of Foreign Affairs and Trade to allow SCU students to conduct part of their studies in government naturopathy and yoga hospitals in India - a global first.

NCNM is the only Australian naturopathic program with formal exchange and articulation agreements with global naturopathic schools.

Global leaders in integrative medicine research


Backed by SCU's high level of research excellence, NCNM is dedicated to optimising the health and wellbeing of individuals and communities in Australia and around the globe by conducting robust, innovative, and internationally significant research.

NCNM's team of internationallyrecognised scholars are leaders in their fields and take a multi-disciplinary approach to delivering research with impact. SCU has state-of-the-art facilities and collaborators that provide wide-ranging opportunities for health research projects.

With access to university-owned clinical facilities and relationships with hospitals and health networks across Australia, we offer unique opportunities for integrative clinical research and practice.

NCNM is the only provider of naturopathic medicine globally that is also ranked as a leader in its disciplinary field by national research assessments.

Since establishment of its contract research arm establishment in mid-2021, NCNM has received more than \$4 million in industry research.

Bridging Science And Tradition



"Pre-clinical research in herbal medicine needs to align with the practice of naturopathy – from more complex models to assays that can answer synergistic questions."

Dr Andrea Bugarcic is developing a practice-tradition-science nexus for pre-clinical research, which is informing US National Institutes of Health recommendations for natural products research.



"Advocating for the respectful inclusion of traditional and complementary medicines in the Australian health sector is an important part of meeting First Nations holistic health and wellbeing needs."

Dr Alana Gall – a Pakana woman – is Australia's first Indigenous scholar focusing on First Nations medicines. Dr Gall is working with the Lowitja Institute and Indigenous organisations to develop Australia's first framework for appropriate development and integration of First Nations medicines.

Building integrative medicine research capacity

Research is embedded into every element of NCNM's work. Undergraduate and postgraduate students develop integrative medicine research skills and help build the integrative medicine evidence base.



"It made me understand how much work goes into research and publications and how valuable integrative approaches can be. I was part of the team. I felt so respected and gained such a wealth of experience."

The Research Futures Scholarship Program provides undergraduate students from across the university the opportunity to conduct a research project in integrative medicine. Projects have included mapping integrative medicine in Australian hospitals, exploring the potential of native medicinal plants, and integrative options for mental health and childhood disorders.

After the Lismore Floods, it was clear that there was a greater role for naturopaths and integrative health practitioners to assist flood recovery efforts. A number of NCNM student-led projects have examined the role of naturopaths in flood recovery, and have helped develop protocols to better prepare and integrate naturopathic responses for communities experiencing natural disasters in the future.

All NCNM Masters programs have a clinical research component. Projects have ranged from embracing telehealth opportunities for naturopathic practice, new treatments for PCOS and anxiety, and exploring the role of psychedelics in clinical practice.

Research with impact



"There are lots of reasons why scientifically we think food affects mood, for example, around 90 percent of serotonin, a chemical that helps us feel happy, is made in our gut by our gut microbes. Diet should always be considered as a treatment for mental health"

Dr Jessica Bayes, Maurice Blackmore Research Fellow, has pioneered research into the effects of nutrition on mental health outcomes in young men, including the impact of diet on reducing depression during Melbourne's COVID lockdowns. Her work has been adopted in national guidelines.



"Research is about the people themselves and how we can help make a difference to the individual. Everyone is different, so even if it works for a percentage of people, I've made a difference and that's the best feeling."

Dr Janet Schloss is recognised as one of the world's leaders in integrative oncology and medicinal cannabis research. Her world-first clinical trial of medicinal cannabis in brain glioblastoma has progressed access to medicinal cannabis for oncology patients.

"Conventional medicine is the main healthcare option in Sierra Leone, though for many people it is expensive and can be hard to access. Traditional medicine is popular not only because it is accessible, but also because it can be effective in complex conditions where conventional treatments often fail"

Dr Peter James completed the world's first empirical study of the role of traditional medicine in post-viral treatment of Ebola survivors, the first global review of the role of integrative approaches in post-viral sequalae, as well as the first review of the role of traditional medicine in sub-Saharan Africa. This work became increasingly relevant during the COVID pandemic and has been integrated into national policies to ensure traditional medicines are included in long COVID and African migrant health.

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"We already know the benefits of integrative medicine in managing chronic pain. NATO, the US Department of Defence and US Veteran Administration recommend integrative health options in military care on this basis. Now we are building the evidence base to help inform future policy around military and veteran care here in Australia"


In conjunction with Defence Health, Professor Jon Wardle conducted Australia's first clinical trial on integrative options – including naturopathic medicine – for military and veteran populations. This program has now been adopted by Australia's largest veteran clinic, is being considered by the DVA, and has led to a broader research program on integrative medicine for Australia's uniformed services.

Developing global integrative medicine leaders



Drawing on his experience working for medicines regulatory authorities in Botswana and Zimbabwe, Roy Chihaka is working with the World Health Organization on his doctoral project to develop a responsive and appropriate model of traditional medicine practitioner and product regulation for sub-Saharan Africa. Roy is passionate about ensuring traditional knowledge continues to guide integrative medicine use, and that regulations don't compromise the integrity of traditional medicine in its quest to make healthcare safer and more accessible.





Daen Medina worked at the National Prescribing Service developing national medicines evidence and policy guidelines before training as a naturopath. Seeing first-hand the potential of guidelines to inform integration of new and existing therapies into health care – evidence alone was often not enough. Daen is working with the Pan American Health Organization Evidence Mapping team to develop guidelines and frameworks to ensure integration of evidence-based natural medicines into national health systems and policies in Latin America.



Sophia Gerontakos completed her naturopathic training and became concerned that naturopathic care was inaccessible to many. After working with Integrative Medicine for the Underserved in the US, Sophia discovered the group visit and shared medical appointment model of integrative health care. Seeing opportunities for the naturopathic profession to reach new populations, as part of her doctorate Sophia conducted a world-first clinical trial of naturopathic group visits for women with endometriosis. Her endometriosis program is already being implemented by naturopaths in Australia, Canada and the US, and group visits have become part of the naturopathic clinical curriculum in those countries.

"It is a priority of mine to nurture the next generation of researchers to support and enable the opportunities to progress their career and succeed in research, and to give patients the best access to integrative health options."

With a background in senior government policy roles, Kerrie Oakes understood the power and potential of transforming local communities through herbal medicine. After training as a herbalist, Kerrie developed grassroots, co-operative models of herbal medicine care through establishing Herbalists Without Borders, ensuring access these invaluable herbal medicine resources to those who need them most. Her doctoral work is focused on developing models of policy integration of community herbalism, to support communities to develop, lead and sustain their own preferred models of integrative healthcare.



"The best thing about being a naturopath is helping people and seeing people get better. There is a global burden of chronic disease that is on the rise, and healthcare is looking for the answer of how to fill that gap and I really feel that naturopaths meet that demand. It is all about educating and empowering the patient."

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Advocacy for a larger role for integrative health

NCNM actively promotes and advocates for a greater role for the naturopathic profession and integrative health.

In 2022 NCNM commissioned a survey of 1,509 Australians to better understand public perceptions and preferences of naturopathic medicine. This information was used to identify priority public support for integration, as well as to identify areas of focus to improve the public's support for naturopathic medicine. As part of broader government efforts, every Australian parliamentarian and senior government official has been provided numerous resources supporting naturopathic medicine, and a 750-page detailed evidence guide highlighting the benefits of integrating naturopathic care was launched at Parliament House, Canberra. NCNM remains active in Australia and internationally in supporting a bigger future for naturopathic medicine and integrative health.





NCNM partners with a number of groups including the ADC Forum, World Health Organisation (WHO), and the World Federation of Public Health (WFPHA), on initiatives that bring together the nation's foremost decision-makers and thought leaders across all sectors to focus on the issues that are critical to future prosperity. This will include sessions focusing on the role of integrative health and health innovation to address future health challenges.

In 2022 NCNM hosted the first annual Natural Products Futures Forum. Sector leaders from government, industry, research and academia came together to set priorities for the growth and development of the Australian natural products sector. This annual event will be held every October.



A solid foundation to build on

Growing demand for courses

Established in mid-2020. NCNM focus courses were developed and established with first enrolments commencing in mid-2021 (for the Master of Advanced Naturopathic Medicine and Graduate Certificate of Naturopathic Medicine). The naturopathic clinical education gualifications and Master of Lifestyle Medicine had their first intake in late 2022.





> Amplify

Since 2020 the NCNM has built a solid foundation of education and research activity, with a pathway to financial sustainability allowing for continued naturopathic activity. A transformational gift could level-up and amplify naturopathic medicine. A generous gift can change the trajectory of an organisation to make exponential impact possible, and can be directed to specific initiatives that are most important to you, or we can help to identify priority areas where this support is needed the most. By providing further innovative support for strategic projects and initiatives NCNM can elevate and amplify the naturopathic profession.

> Solidify

A named endowment can fund a university naturopathic presence in perpetuity, while growing year to year and serving as a vehicle for others to support the growth of the naturopathic profession. An endowment works by using income generated from an endowment investment, while preserving the principle to support activities indefinitely. A significant gift (\$5m+) can fund the Centre and its leadership in perpetuity, allowing for a strategic appointment above and beyond. A named endowment can be used for any purpose, but may only be used for the nominated purpose and not transferred to other purposes by the University, ensuring a lasting legacy that benefits the naturopathic profession.
